

THIS IS NOT AN EASY CONCEPT TO GRASP!





v. 1-Do you see what this means—all these pioneers who blazed the way, all these veterans cheering us on? It means we'd better get on with it. Strip down, start running—and never quit! No extra spiritual fat, no parasitic sins.

v. 2-Keep your eyes on Jesus, who both began and finished this race we're in. Study how he did it.

Because he never lost sight of where he was headed—that exhilarating finish in and with God—he could put up with anything along the way: Cross, shame, whatever.

v. 3-And now he's *there*, in the place of honor, right alongside God. When you find yourselves flagging in your faith, go over that story again, item by item, that long litany of hostility he plowed through. *That* will shoot adrenaline into your souls!

v. 4-In this all-out match against sin, others have suffered far worse than you, to say nothing of what Jesus went through—all that bloodshed! So don't feel sorry for yourselves. Or have you forgotten how good parents treat children, and that God regards you as His dear children?

v. 5b-My dear child, don't shrug off God's discipline, but don't be crushed by it either.

It's the child he loves that he disciplines; the child he embraces, he also corrects.

v. 7-God is educating you; that's why you must never drop out. He's treating you as His dear legitimate children. This trouble you're in isn't punishment; it's discipline, the normal experience of legitimate children. Only irresponsible parents leave children to fend for themselves. Would you prefer an irresponsible God?

v. 9-We respect our own parents for disciplining and not spoiling us, so why not embrace God's discipline so we can truly live? While we were children, our parents did what seemed best to them. But God is doing what is best for us, disciplining us to live God's holy best.

v.11-At the time, discipline isn't much fun. It always feels like it's going against the grain. Later, of course, it pays off handsomely, for it's the well-disciplined who find themselves mature in their relationship with God.

v.-12 So don't sit around on your hands! No more dragging your feet! Clear the path for long-distance runners so no one will trip and fall, so no one will step in a hole and sprain an ankle. Help each other out. And run for it!

THE WORD "DISCIPLINE" USED IN THIS PASSAGE IS THE GREEK WORD PAIDEIA.

PAIDEIA HAS THE FOLLOWING MEANINGS:

1) the training and education of children (which relates to the cultivation of mind and morals, and employs not only commands and admonitions, but also reproof and punishment) It also includes the training and care of the body.

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PAIDEIA HASTHE FOLLOWING MEANINGS:

- 2) whatever in adults also cultivates the soul, especially by correcting mistakes and curbing passions.
- 2a) instruction which aims at increasing virtue.
- 2b) chastisement, chastening, (i.e. hardships that God allows to make us better)

MORE DISCIPLINE SCRIPTURE:

- Proverbs 3:11-12 My child, do not despise discipline from the Lord, and do not loathe his rebuke. For the Lord disciplines those he loves, just as a father disciplines the son in whom he delights.
- Job 5:17 "Behold, blessed is the one whom God reproves; therefore despise not the discipline of the Almighty."

MORE DISCIPLINE SCRIPTURE:

- Proverbs 12:1 The one who loves discipline loves knowledge, but the one who hates reproof is stupid.
- Proverbs 13:24 The one who spares his rod hates his child, but the one who loves his child is diligent in disciplining him.
- Revelation 3:19 All those I love, I rebuke and discipline.

1. It is proof of legitimate family identity:

7 As you endure this divine discipline, remember that God is treating you as his own children. Who ever heard of a child who is never disciplined by its father? 8 If God doesn't discipline you as he does all of his children, it means that you are illegitimate and are not really his children at all.

2. The purpose is our good—God disciplines out of love:

1. 6 For the Lord disciplines those he loves, and he punishes each one he accepts as his child.

3. The goal is our holiness:

v 10-God's discipline is always good for us, so that we might share in his holiness.

4. The product is assured:

v.11-No discipline is enjoyable while it is happening—it's painful! But afterward there will be a peaceful harvest of righteousness for those who are trained in this way.

5. The end result is meant to be for our strengthening and security:

v 12-13-So take a new grip with your tired hands and strengthen your weak knees. 13 Mark out a straight path for your feet so that those who are weak and lame will not fall but become strong.

Two wrong responses to discipline in this passage: First, not taking it seriously:

"Don't make light of the Lord's discipline" (v. 5a). Some people do not learn the lessons God intends because they refuse to admit that sufferings are meant for their instruction. The <u>paideia</u> has not accomplished its purpose, so God will have to allow them to go through more discipline.

The second wrong response is **to become depressed and give up**: "...don't give up when he corrects you." (v 5b).

We either treat discipline as nothing, or we say it is too much, that God is punishing us beyond what we can bear. We say that he does not care for us or that he is too hard. But if we give way to depression and fail to respond correctly to God's painful discipline, we will have to go through paideia all over again.

What should be our proper response?

 We should <u>rejoice</u> when God disciplines us and draw comfort from the biblical principle: "For the Lord disciplines those he loves, and he punishes each one he accepts as his child." (v. 6).

Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing. (James 1:2-4)

 We can reason like this: "I am experiencing painful discipline; therefore, I can conclude that God is my heavenly Father and I am his child. God loves me with an everlasting love. I am not an illegitimate child."

CULTURAL CONNECTION



More often than not, Roman men of this time had concubines in addition to a legal wife. Roman fathers would financially support their children by their concubines, but they would not discipline them. These fathers disciplined only the sons of the legal wife so that they could be their heirs. Only disciplined children had privileges and communion with the father. Illegitimate children did not.

UNDERSTANDING DISCIPLINE AS LOVE

It is difficult for us to see the link between love and hardships. The devil tells us these are opposites, but the Scripture tells us they belong together. When we are going through discipline, Satan will whisper, "So that's how your loving God treats you, huh?"

If he can get you to doubt God's love or His sovereignty over your situation, he has succeeded in driving you away from your loving heavenly Father.

IS FATHER GOD GOOD AND LOVING?

CS Lewis: "We are taught in the Scripture that God is Good and Loving. Those are two of His eternal characteristics.

By the goodness of God we mean nowadays almost exclusively His *lovingness*; and in this we may be right. And by Love, in this context, most of us mean *kindness*- the desire to see others than the self happy; not happy in this way or in that, but just happy."

IS FATHER GOD GOOD AND LOVING?

"What would really satisfy us would be a God who said of anything we happened to like doing, 'What does it matter so long as they are contented?' We want, in fact, not so much a Father in Heaven as a Grandfather in heaven."



IS FATHER GOD GOOD AND LOVING?


"We want a senile benevolence who, as they say, likes to see people enjoying themselves', and whose plan for the universe was simply that it might be truly said at the end of each day, 'a good time was had by all'....

I should very much like to live in a universe which was governed on such lines. But since it is abundantly clear that I don't, and since I have reason to believe, nevertheless, that God is Love, I conclude that my conception of love needs correction. "




UNDERSTANDING DISCIPLINE AS LOVE


Do not interpret God's love by your circumstances. Rather, interpret your circumstances by God's love.

50:20




Job--the whole message of the book of Job is that God allows suffering to refine us and make us more holy.



Jesus—was made perfect through suffering!

James 5:8-9-Although he was a son, he learned obedience through what he suffered. And being made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation to all who obey him.





Because He has loved us from eternity with an everlasting love, God disciplines us to form His character in us so we may be qualified for eternal fellowship with Him. He disciplines us because He loves us, not because He hates us.

UNDERSTANDING DISCIPLINE AS LOVE

When difficult times come upon us, God is at work in the midst of the struggle and pain as any loving father would, not necessarily punishing but "disciplining" us so that we learn and grow.



UNDERSTANDING DISCIPLINE AS LOVE

Yes, sometimes we need to be corrected. Other times we just need to be shaped and molded and directed. The presence of pain does not necessarily indicate the presence of sin. viz- The Book of Job!
